
ST. AGNES HOME AND SCHOOL FOR BOYS, SPARKILL, (ROCKLAND COUNTY) NEW YORK

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¹ "House's Kid" is a long-standing term of pride denoting an abandoned or orphaned youngster who was admitted to and lived for a number of years at St. Agnes Home and School for Boys, a Catholic Convent in Sparkill, NY. Some were sent direct to St. Agnes from New York Cities and Towns, but most came from other Rockland County Catholic Homes or Orphanages such as St. Dominic's Convent in Blauvelt, NY or St. Agatha's Home in Nanuet, NY when they graduated from the eighth grade to attend Tappan Zee High School in the nearby town of Piermont. (Those not attending TZHS were given technical ("shop") training at St. Agnes. The term "House" relates to the building they lived and slept in, thus becoming a "House's Kid." Annual reunions of the St. Agnes Alumni Association are held on the Piermont Pier, moving from the American Legion building in Sparkill several years ago.

Tell me, what were their names...?

Gerald F. Merna and David Kee look for familiar names on the memorial plaque at the Dominican Sisters convent in Sparkill. The plaque commemorates the 39 alumni of St. Agnes Home for Boys, run by the Sparkill Dominicans who died in World War

The two were among a number of alumni who attended ceremonies Saturday celebrating the 60th anniversary of the alumni association.

Merna read out the name of his brother, George, one of seven siblings at St. Agnes.

George Merna, a Navy signalman, died on an LST at the battle of Leyte Gulf.

Boys from St. Agnes attended Tappan Zee High School; many left to serve in the armed forces at the outbreak of World War II. Gerald Merna was 18 when he was killed.

St. Agnes alumni were also part of the larger community of Piermont and Sparkill. Gerald Merna married Dorothy Sedlack of Piermont. He had not seen his classmate, David Kee, in 56 years.





lumni honor war dead

Ex-St. Agnes residents pay tribute at event prior to 60th annual picnic

SPARKILL - Frank Bradicich gazed at a plaque engraved with the names of 39 fellow alumni from the St. Agnes Home for Boys as he stood on the grounds of the Dominican Convent yesterday morning.

"These were my friends, my brothers," Bradicich, 82, said of the men killed in action during World War II and the Korean War. "To me, every name is a real person — they're guys I grew up with."

The Staten Island man spent more than 10 years at the orphenge from 1620 to 1041.

Accompanied by his daughter and granddaughter, Bradicich, a World War II veteran, joined other members of the St. Agnes Alumni Association as Piermont Memorial Post 7462, Veterans of Foreign Wars, held

"Barely out of their teens, they went from the ball fields of St. Agnes to the battlefields, giving their lives for our freedom," said Paul Fabrizzi after singing the national anthem. The St. Agnes alumnus asked those

gathered to "never forget what these men did for us." Before the rifle squad fired a salute, the name of each serviceman was read aloud. Gerald Merna gently bowed his head as he said, "my brother, George Merna."

At the age of 17, George Merna joined the Navy; two years later, he was killed when a Japanese sub-marine's torpedo struck his ship.

"This whole event has really touched me deeply," said Merna, a retired Marine who served in the Ko-rean and Vietnam wars.

Merna and his six siblings were raised by the Do-

minican nuns, he said.

To see men I knew as boys here 50 years ago and to recognize the loved ones we've lost together, as a

"In spite of all the things they never had, no families awaiting their return, they have given so much," said Jerry Donnellan, director of the Rockland Veterans Service Agency in New City. "I am proud to say thank you."

Bradicich said many of his fellow St. Agnes com-rades were inspired to join the military because of their sports coach and mentor, Jim Faulk.

Faulk joined the Marine Corps during World War II and after his service, returned to St. Agnes to work with the boys

"He was the only father many of us ever knew," said

Bradicich as he choked back tears. "He was a great man and a great influence — we all wanted to be like

The Sparkill Dominicans opened the St. Agnes Home for Boys when they located to Rockland in 1884. Over the years, thousands of children passed through the orphanage, which served as a home for boys up to the age of 18. St. Agnes closed in 1977, and two years later, its buildings were torn down. After the ceremony, the St. Agnes Alumni Associa-

tion held its 60th annual picnic at the pavilion on the Piermont Pier.

But before leaving the convent grounds, 15 alumni gathered around the commemorative plaques, at the base of a flagpole, for a picture.

"We were all family," said Joe Carroll as they began to position themselves. "We're still a family."

ST. AGNES TO BE TORN DOWN

It is our sad duty to inform you that St. Agnes School and Convent will be demolished in the early fall of this year. Present plans call for the razing of all buildings, except the chapel and gymnasium, around September 15th, to be replaced by senior citizen housing units.

The main building, nearly 100 years old, which housed the dormitories and nuns' quarters, has been vacant since the last boys departed over two years ago. Deterioration, plus the high cost of heating and maintenance were major factors in the decision to demolish it, together with the ancillary buildings, including the school. It has been reported that construction of the first housing units will begin shortly on the south field, below the lake.

We are informed that many objects from the old buildings are to be auctioned off, probably some time in August. If you are interested in attending the auction, please contact the Alumni for details.

REUNION PICNIC

The annual reunion picnic, possibly the last one we will be able to hold on the grounds of St. Agnes, is scheduled for Saturday, August 11th, beginning at 1 p.m. This will be a different type of picnic from those of previous years—it's FREE!

Due to the high cost of food, especially meat, we would have had to increase the cost of tickets substantially this year. This would have created a burden on many of our members, espeially those with large families. Therefore, the committee suggests that all those attending bring their own food. This way everyone can afford to attend. The Alumni will provide free beer and soda.

Although some tables and chairs will be available, we suggest that you bring your own lounge chairs, tables and blankets. The location of the picnic will be at the gymnasium area. For those of you who haven't been back since the gym was built, it's on the site of the old "Fellow's" field, next to the school.

We strongly urge all members who can possibly make it to attend this year's picnic, since it will be the last chance to see St. Agnes as you remembered it. Be sure to bring your camera. Also, we would like anyone with a musical instrument to bring that along, too, for an evening sing-along.

We are aware that many of our members, especially those living in New York City do not have cars, so we have compiled several bus schedules for your convenience in attending the picnic. These schedules are for Saturday:

From the Port Authority Bus Terminal at 41st Street & 8th Avenue, you can get buses at the Manhattan Transit (Mohawk) Lines which leave at 10:15, 11:15 and 12 Noon for Sparkill. These buses return to New York from Sparkill at 3:07, 4:47, 5:47, 6:47 and 8:07.

Buses of the Red and Tan Lines (Rockland Coaches) leave the 175th Street Terminal in upper Manhattan at 10:40, 11:40 and 12:25 p.m.

There also are buses that come down from Poughkeepsie and Peekskill. Please call the bus lines in that area for schedules.
